Our new Vice President and Program Chair, Regina Tune, is developing informative programs about **Color** this year. She plans to use brief demonstrations and book reviews at the meetings to provide context to the specific Color topic for that meeting as well as break-out sessions to further explore the topic through discussion, practice, critiques, and other methods. At the time of our September meeting, MAPS will have just completed its second workshop featuring a nationally known instructor. MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Kathy Waltermire

Writing to pastelists about pastels is a bit daunting. Having seen and admired your work in MAPS shows, I KNOW how skilled you are. But we share a love of this medium, so here goes.

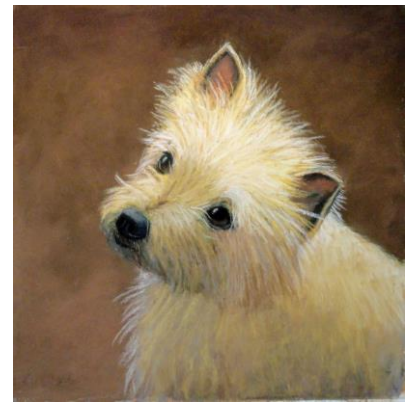
Like many of you I've had a lifelong love of drawing. I began to take it seriously in my mid 30s with college classes in studio drawing, art history, and photography. I first tried pastels years later in a night class on pastel portraits. Now I know how truly awful that class was. Had to unlearn everything with a couple years of study at The Art League School in Alexandria. It was there, after my retirement from a 30-year Defense Department career, that things began to come together. I was hooked on soft pastels – a “drawing” medium that you can paint with.

About that time, I was fortunate to be accepted in a cooperative in Occoquan – The Artists' Undertaking Gallery. For 3½ years I learned a lot about hanging shows, selling, and working with other artists. (And about people sticking their heads in the door, seeing “art,” and backing out.) I also did a one-year stint in a similar gallery in Fredericksburg. It was all good experience. Now I work out of my home studio and enjoy membership and showing in area art groups – Colonial Beach Artists' Guild, Fredericksburg Center for the Creative Arts, and especially MAPS. It's a thrill if a judge chooses one of my pieces for a ribbon. A local gallery, JarrettThor Fine Arts, allows me to hang a few pieces continually and has featured me in a 3-woman show a few times.

My work is realistic in style. Like many realism painters I feel pressure to “get looser.” But lately have been thinking that if I enjoy realism, why not just do it. It's especially rewarding when taking on the challenge of “can I portray that?” and it works. So, I love still life, but also enjoy portraits, pets, florals and sometimes figures. I've worked at landscape but it's not my strong suit, unless it can be an “outdoor still life.” Feeling a bit bored with myself, I recently got a copy of Dawn Emerson's book Pastel Innovations, and am trying to put a little more excitement in my paintings.

My technique is not unusual – underpainting on mounted sanded pastel paper with layers of pastel over it. I now use UArt boards, but sometimes mount paper on gatorboard using bookbinders glue, and have also made my own surfaces on gatorboard with acrylic medium and pumice. I still hoard a few sheets of Wallis paper. Occasionally I enjoy graphite drawings on toned smooth paper with pastel pencil highlights. Although I have three trays of various pastels, I seem to work out of my smaller travel box most of the time. My favorite pastels continue to be Unison and Rembrandt. The color charts from Dakota Pastels are very helpful in keeping track of colors I have or need.

I've learned from some wonderful pastelists, including Kitty Wallis, Susan Ogilvie, and Liz Haywood-Sullivan. (It was from Kitty Wallis that I

paintings that were winners in the Pastel World Exhibit. I can say that all the paintings in the exhibit were stunning, and I am so glad that I did not have to choose those that would receive awards. **And there will be a drawing for a set of the new extra soft Art Spectrum Pastels!**

Color in Pastel

- Value/monochromatic color
- Analogous color
- Complimentary color

After the demo, we will break up into groups and do small paintings using the color scheme that was demonstrated.

Desmond O'Hagan Capture Light - Interpret Values and Shapes

Dates: Sept. 8 – 10, 2017



The MidAtlantic Pastel Society will host Desmond O'Hagan for a three-day workshop, "Capture Light-Interpret Values and Shapes", Sept. 8 - 10. There are still openings if you wish to attend.

A comprehensive workshop for pastel painters. This three-day course will include:

- A slide presentation and lecture on painting in pastels
- Discussions on painting materials, surfaces, developing your painting style, and working methods unique to pastels
- Demos emphasizing composition, color, and technique
- Daily individual critiques of students' works in progress

Desmond O'Hagan is a **master pastel** with the Pastel Society of America, and is a member of the "**Master's Circle**" of the Int. Assoc. of Pastel Societies. He has been a professional artist for over twenty years and has had numerous one-man shows throughout the United States. He has also participated in group shows in Japan, China, and France. O'Hagan has received several awards for his art through the Pastel Society of America, IAPS, and the Salmagundi Club in New York City. He has judged many national shows for pastels and oils and conducted workshops throughout the United States.

Desmond has judged the portrait/figurative paintings for The Pastel Journal's 2009 Pastel 100, and was a juror for the 2011 International Association of Pastel Societies' convention exhibition. His paintings have been featured in several publications and books, including: "American Art Collector", "International Fine Artist", "The Artist Magazine", "The Pastel Journal", "Southwest Art", "American Artist", "Artists and Illustrators" (England), United Airlines' "Hemispheres" magazine, The Best of Pastels/The Best of Oils, and "Gekkan Bijyutsu" (Japan). O'Hagan's paintings are represented by galleries in Santa Fe, NM, Denver, CO, and Edmonds, WA.

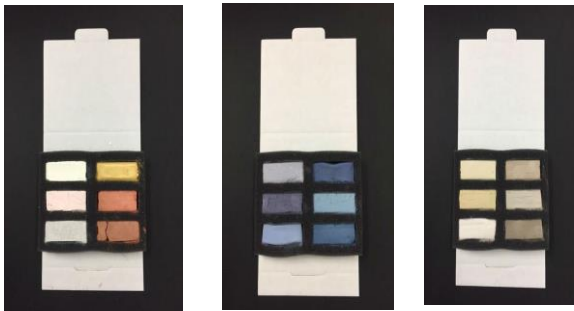
